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Dakota Access Pipeline Illinois Economic & Fiscal Impact Fact Sheet

Highlights

During the construction stage of the project, Iowa land owners will receive about \$31 Million in “easement and damages” payments for the restoration and use of their right-of-way. Once the pipeline is in operation, each year Illinois local governments will receive about \$750,000 in property tax revenues for above-ground operations. The pipeline is exempted from property taxes in Illinois because it is buried underground.

Construction stage (2015-2016):

- Pipeline length: 177 miles
- Cost to Dakota Access, LLC for constructing the Illinois portion: \$515.8 Million
- Estimated amount of that cost which will be spent in Illinois: \$366.6 Million
- Estimated impact on production and sales: \$735.4 Million
- Estimated impact on labor income: \$303.3 Million
- Estimated number of additional job-years of employment: about 5,000
- Estimated increase in state sales, use, gross receipts and lodging taxes: \$16.4 Million
- Estimated increase in local sales, use, gross receipts and lodging taxes: \$3 Million
- Estimated increase in state individual income tax: \$7.7 Million

Operations and maintenance stage (annually beginning in 2017):

- Estimated increase in production and sales: \$3.1 Million
- Estimated increase in labor income: \$1.5 Million
- Estimated increase in full-time jobs: 20
- Estimated increase in state sales, use, gross receipts and lodging taxes: \$38,000
- Estimated increase in local sales, use, gross receipts and lodging taxes: \$12,000
- Estimated increase in state individual income tax: \$45,000
- Estimated increase in local property taxes: about \$750,000
